BY GIGI STOLL

Founded in 2020 by photographer Gigi Stoll, Two By Two Media provides women artists over the age of 70, free technical, marketing and consulting support—and the critical inspiration and personal attention they need to thrive and remain visible in their artistic careers.

Two by Two Media is a service organization. No fees are exchanged and bartering is welcomed.

Age has no limit in Art. It's my pleasure to give my time and energy providing a voice and a platform for their work.

I arrived in New York via my native San Antonio, Texas in 1990. Since then, I have always felt compelled to give back to the city that has given me so much. Being of service has always been the best therapy for me. So, that first year in New York, I began volunteering with the Red Cross visiting elder New Yorkers and children and volunteering with AIDS/HIV-service organization Bailey House, Meals on Wheels, the Police Athletic League, Make-A-Wish Foundation, New York Cares, and SAGE (Services & Advocacy for LGBT Elders).

Currently I am the Director of Photography with XO World Project, a pediatric medical and women's health mission, documenting

teams of doctors who perform free surgeries for children in Kenya, Ghana, Myanmar, Jamaica, Egypt and other countries.

In 2020, when Covid plagued the city, I was isolated in my apartment, unable to engage in the service work that has sustained me. I knew, though, that I was not alone. I thought about my dear friend, photographer, Artist #1, Flo Fox, 77 stuck at home in Chelsea. We had always had an almost symbiotic, artistic friendship since meeting in 1991, and we were no longer able to meet for our weekly photography talks and creative projects. I also considered other older female artists, similarly isolated and perhaps with archives of important work that wasn't getting the attention it deserved. I kept thinking about them shuttered away, perhaps without a platform or voice for their work or the technical or marketing skills to get their art into the public eye. With that idea in mind, Two by Two was born.

Often when I invite new artists to join Two by Two Media, they become suspicious that someone wants to help them without a fee. People ask all the time, "Why do you help them for free?" I say, why wouldn't I? There should be support in place nationwide for artists of a certain age.

I chose women because I've

always felt they've repeatedly been tography shows and loved talking underrepresented and chose the age limit of 70 and above.

I met Artist #2, West Murray, at a party in Tribeca in 2016, and she became another artist that I started visiting weekly during the pandemic. Hours spent looking through West's archives and art, wonderful dinners in exchange for website and online publishing work soon turned into a friendship. It was thrilling to see her face light up after someone gave her work the encouragement and positivity it nected to Two by Two Media via deserved.

Next I met Artist #3 Tziporah Salamon, at an event at West Murray's loft in 2021. Tziporah had a sharp marvelous style and eye for vintage clothing. The former muse of Bill Cunningham, we instantly collaborated and I started photographing and documenting Tzippy to help her with her modeling and acting career. There was no money involved, just pure adventure and fun.

The next Artist #4 Donna Bassin, contacted me via Instagram and we discussed her art. I was immediately inspired by her powerhouse multimedia work and invited her into Two by Two Media in 2021. Donna mentioned that no one had ever offered to help her with her work.

I have known Artist #5 Meryl Meisler for years through Flo Fox, we would see each other at pho-

shop. Meryl's full of energy and brilliant ideas, and I was dying to invite her into the Two by Two Media group. In 2022, Meryl invited me to join her in photographing the festival of Purim in Brooklyn. I picked her up in Chelsea, and as we were driving across the bridge, popped the question. Meryl was delighted and immediately accepted! An amazing group of creative women was coming together.

Artist #6, Salimah Ali, was con-West Murray. I fell in love with her strong color portraits and soon invited her to the group in 2022. It took some time to earn her trust, but Salimah's work spoke for itself. Two by Two made a special exception to take on an artist that was younger than our benchmark of 70 years old.

At a birthday party in 2022, I met 90 year old Artist #7 Sheila Schwid. We were sitting right next to one another and struck up a conversation. Sheila is a prolific painter who lives in the Westbeth Artist Lofts. During the party, Sheila revealed her artwork on her iphone, the work was magnificent, we planned a studio visit and the rest was history. Sheila also knows Tziporah Salamon, as they visit the same synagogue each weekend.

Artist #8, Donna Ferrato, is a powerful, award winning volcano of an artist documenting women's domestic violence for decades.

With that in mind, I shed a tear and gave me a bone crushing hug when I invited her for a Two by Two group show, and into Two by Two Media in 2023. we came together with this beau-

As the group serendipitously came together, beautifully with legs of its own. I really wanted to bring on another artist who specialized in fine art and sculpture. While visiting friends at the Salamon Art Gallery in Tribeca, I noticed a large colorful art book on a table. As soon as I turned the page, I knew I had that artist in Artist #9 Edwina Sandys. The gallery kindly reached out to Edwina who is 84. I was soon invited to a cocktail soiree at Edwina's and I contacted her the following week to join Two by Two in 2023.

We have big ambitions with small pockets supported by a dedicated, talented micro team who volunteer their time for small income. We accept donations through Fractured Atlas and have been fortunate enough to receive a Leonian grant to support our first group show. We could assist so many more women artists on the Two by Two media waitlist, but we can only do as much as our fiscal support allows. At this moment, we're concentrating on our first group show at Carter Burden Gallery. I met the CBG's curator, Marlena Vaccaro, at a show she curated for Flo Fox in the 1990's. I purchased a print at the show to support them both. I had also been to several gallery openings at Carter Burden and

loved that they also have a similar mission in supporting of elder female artists. With that in mind, I contacted Marlena with a proposal for a Two by Two group show, and we came together with this beautiful show, Carter Burden Gallery Presents Two by Two Media. I was ecstatic and couldn't wait to share the news with the ladies. The artists are so grateful and soaring with pride.

Looking towards the future, Two by Two Media will start a mentor-ship/pairing program, matching younger underprivileged artists with our elder artists for inspiration and weekly/ monthly visits. We currently have two artistic pairings in place and plans for documentation in late 2023. The Two by Two Media store will be launching soon on Instagram, allowing the artists to sell select artwork online. The artists will benefit fully, with no commission to Two by Two Media.

This is not work, this is friendship.

BIOGRAPHY - I was born Florence Blossom Fox, September 26, 1945, in Miami Beach Florida where my father started a honey factory. He died two years later when he was just 38 years old. My mother then moved back to our apartment in Woodside, Queens, New York City. She raised her four kids there until her death (when I was fourteen years old). I remained quiet with my family in mourning at the cemetery; with morbid curiosity, I wondered who her neighboring souls were. Since then, wherever I have travelled, I photographed intriguing monuments and grave site statuary. When I left home I got my real education on the streets. At age eighteen, marriage and mother-hood came simultaneously.

I didn't get a camera until I got divorced at age twenty-six. A, "street photographer" since 1972, my work has been published and exhibited internationally. I've had the freedom and good fortune for extensive travel. I've taken over 130,000 photographs and subjects vary but tend toward the "ironic reality."

My work was shown at the Nikon House, IBM gallery, and is in the permanent collections of the Brooklyn Museum and the Smithsonian. Images have also been published in New York Magazine and have been exhibited internationally. My photography covers all aspects of being a single woman/artist in New York City: "Asphalt Gardens, 69 photos by Flo Fox" was published by the national access center in 1981. The "Up in Smoke" collection (of 57 photos), 11 photos, were published in "Life" magazine, Sept. 1994. All these images showed the rising cost of cigarettes. My work was in a two-person exhibit with "Weegee the Famous" in Paris, France 1987, and a two-person show "opposites attract" with Gigi Stoll in Italy 2012. I was also an advocate for the disabled, taking photos where things were not accessible and blocking the public buses until the driver stopped and lowered the ramp for wheelchairs.

IRONIC REALITY

BIOGRAPHY - West Murray, born November 2nd, 1948, in Oceanside, NY, is an American street photographer, collector, designer, and stylist whose career began with a simple passion for vintage kids' clothes.

After amassing an unparalleled collection, West began renting out dead stock for period movies such as Forrest Gump, Angel Heart, and Dead Man Walking, as well as period commercials like Jello (1982). With the success of her rental business, she opened KIDZ, a kids' vintage store in SoHo, New York, which was profiled by the New York Times. She then went on to design a line of kids' clothes called IZZY with a partner, which made its way into Barney's, Neiman Marcus, Saks, and children's boutiques across the country. As a stylist, West did ads for Bloomingdales, Wrangler, and Lee jeans in the 70's, 80's, and 90's with different photographers and then worked exclusively with award-winning photographer Sacha Waldman for ten years, shooting rappers like 50 Cent, Jay-Z, Nas, and Missy Elliot, before finally picking up a camera of her own.

West started taking photos in 2000 of a wide variety of subjects. She spend her life searching for the unusual whether it is beautiful people, odd people on the streets of New York City or fantastic pieces of clothing. Her work encompasses the eccentric characters who make up the underbelly of New York.

As a photographer, West's work is heartfelt, moving, complicated, and beautiful. She is fascinated with the uniqueness of characters. In describing her own work, West has coined the term "photo-therapy." She likes to take photos of misunderstood people and make them feel welcomed. She uses the camera to move beyond the facade of her subjects to the vital humanity underneath.

THE LOFT MUSEUM

I've never processed things quite the same as other people. I realized this early on. For example, when listening to a song I don't really hear the words. The words lace together in my ears and exchange their meaning for emotion, the way a thread gets lost in a wider pattern. That emotion hits me deeply; but if someone asks me what I think a song is saying, it's never the meaning they got from it... Hah!

Always trying to keep order of it all

THE ART OF DRESSING



BIOGRAPHY - Donna Bassin is a fine art photographer, filmmaker, and trauma psychologist born in Brooklyn, New York 1950, and now living in Montclair, New Jersey. She works on long-term projects responding to the injurious aspects of contemporary life: post-traumatic stress, racism, social injustice, and, most recently, the destruction of our environment. Donna Bassin looks to the power of photographic arts to assist in transforming grief over catastrophic losses into the power of witnessing and action rather than apathy and melancholia.

Her life work has resulted in two award-winning documentaries, two solo museum exhibitions, public art installations, book covers, and participation in many curated group shows. Tricycle, Fotonostrum, Grazia Magazine, Lens Magazine, and LandEscape Art Review have published her photographs and writing. Donna Bassin received the 2021 New Jersey Council on the Arts Fellowship in Photography, the top 50 photographers for Critical Mass 2022, and is currently a finalist for Critical Mass 2024.

ENVIRONMENTAL MELANCHOLIA

BY DONNA BASSIN

In this time of climate crisis when intervention is urgent and still possible, I have created a series of 'memorial' landscapes to injured and dying environments using visual metaphors to celebrate our natural world, call attention to the precariousness of our global ecosystem, and provide an opportunity to contemplate unthinkable experiences of environmental devastation.

As the natural world suffers increased destruction, our physical survival is threatened, annihilation anxiety rises, and we retreat into denial and inactivity. We must raise our emotional connection to the climate crisis to move from the position of passive bystanders stuck in environmental melancholia to engaged witnesses.

Inspired by and reacting to the idealized, seductive beauty of Hudson River School landscape painters, the photomontages are, at first glance, pictorial and idyllic. I hope viewers will be drawn in by the splendor of the landscape and the ease of relating to a familiar subject. A closer look challenges the sublime. I intend to puncture complacency around the "ongoingness" of our environment. I want observers to look beyond their expectations and ask, "Wait, what is happening here?"

I alter the colors and scale with editing tools and materially affix a photograph of a flourishing nature scene on rice paper onto a base print of a depleted environment. I link the two photographs through a color relationship or composition —

for example, a mountain's curve to a line in a stream – and secure them with photo corners. These postcards from the past reference souvenirs gathered in a scrapbook for remembrance: our natural world reduced to a nostalgic relic.

Our planet is in a precarious place, disintegrating as we lose glaciers, animals, trees, and fertile land. I attempt to stop things from vanishing, fix the harm, restore the losses, and put the land back together. I tear natural resources from one photograph and hastily connect them to another photograph of a depleted environment with Japanese washi tape, photo corners, or embroidery thread, creating a visceral experience of damage and repair.

BIOGRAPHY - Meryl Meisler, born 1951 in the South Bronx, raised in North Massapequa, Long Island, NY.

For me, photography is a form of visual memoir.

I don't go to photograph; I photograph where I'm going.

Inspired by Diane Arbus, Jacques-Henri Lartigue and her dad Jack Meisler's passion for photography, Meryl Meisler enrolled in her first photography class in 1973, taught by Cavalliere Ketchum at The University of Wisconsin - Madison. She moved to NYC in 1975 to study with the legendary Lisette Model; while documenting her own life, with her camera screwed to her quirky eye. When Meryl retired from being an NYC Public School Art Teacher in 2010, she began releasing her archives. As time capsules of New York in the seventies and eighties, her shots are a simultaneous celebration of discos and strip clubs, her Jewish family and Long Island suburb, or intermediate school life in one of Brooklyn's toughest neighborhoods. Impertinent and comical, Meryl captures in black and white or color moments of pure joy at the center of daily hardships, plunging us into a fascinating time and city.

Meryl Meisler lives and works in New York City and Woodstock, NY, continuing the photographic memoir she began in 1973 – a uniquely American story, sweet and sassy with a pinch of mystery. CLAMP represents her work.

SUNNY

BY MERYL MEISLER

Let me tell you about Sunny, my marvelous mother.

Sylvia Frances Schulman (Sunny) was born August 10, 1923, in the Bronx, the youngest child of Russian immigrants Ida (Rothstein) and Meyer Schulman. Ida would sneak out of her parent's apartment to go dancing with Meyer. Sylvia and her siblings Joseph and Evelyn grew up poor during the Great Depression. Papa had odd jobs and opened a candy store. Mama ran polka games in their apartment, and Sylvia became a keypunch operator to make ends meet.

At 17, Sylvia met Jack Meisler, a printer's apprentice, at a dance. They liked to frequent the Savoy in Harlem and married in 1942 when Jack was home on leave from the Coast Guard. Sylvia helped Jack start his own business, Excel Printing Company. Kenneth was born in 1948; Meryl arrived in 1951. My earliest Bronx memory was Mom telling us that Kenny slept in George Washington's bed, and I slept in Marsha Washington's.

With the GI Bill, Sylvia and Jack bought a house in N. Massapequa, Long Island, in 1954. Sylvia became Sunny, a vibrant community member. They helped found Congregation Beth-El. Sunny was President of the Temple Sisterhood and the Pythian Sisters. With a voice like Billie Holiday and a passion for live

theater, she performed with the sisterhoods. Mitchell was born in 1958. In 1950s fashion, she was a stay-athome mom who volunteered to help people with learning or physical impairments. There were often bottles of champagne in our house from winning dance or beautiful legs contests. A generous "balabusta," she always welcomed friends and family to our home, especially on holidays. Sunny was a "tummler," the life of the part, fiercely loyal, honest, "no BS" people person who could talk to anyone and a lover of animals. We had a cat, fish, turtles, chickens, gerbils, ducks, and dogs. Was she perfect? Hell no, who is? Sunny swore like a sailor, smoked cigarettes, and sometimes held on to grudges.

It was Sunny's idea to start "The Mystery Club." About a dozen couples would take turns planning a mystery night out every month for nearly two decades. The adventures included trips to a nudist colony, haunted house, séances, making a vinyl recording of "Strangers in The Night," fencing lessons, and going to the Gay Continental Baths to see a cabaret performer. Mornings after Mystery nights, Mom and Dad would be laughing hysterically. We couldn't wait to hear their stories. Imagine what they didn't tell us.

As her kids got older, Sunny wanted to get a job. At first, she sold auto parts to gas stations, then founded

Genée Cosmetics with a Mystery
Club friend, and held make-up
parties. Sunny found her calling as
an employment agency "headhunter" specializing in accountants.
Marion Hale (pseudonym) took pride
in helping people find jobs, especially women. To this day, my brothers'
families and I use an accountant our
mom found a job for.

After 34 years of a rocky marriage, Dad left in 1975; they divorced in 1978. Mom said that although her marriage failed, she had no regrets because they got something right-they had three wonderful, smart, and beautiful children. Sunny bragged to everyone about her kids.

When I came out as a Lesbian in 1975, she was not thrilled and insisted I go to therapy. I still do. Rejection was never a fear or question. Sunny loved her children unconditionally. She supported our interests and accepted our friends and life partners.

Sunny met Jack Donenfeld, a waiter, at a dance studio in Brooklyn in 1979 and married a year later. They retired in 1985, becoming snowbirds, migrating between Sunrise Lake, Florida, and Kiamesha Lake, NY. Retirement was fun, fun, fun – dancing, singing, Yiddish club, and live shows. Sunny said she had the best of both worlds.

Sunny started to fade in her early 70s. Short-term memory loss developed into Alzheimer's. 2001, Mom and I went for our usual walks near my home. There was a famil-

iar sparkle in her eye and a knowing smile. "Ma, you're really there, aren't you?" "Yes," she replied, glowing. It was as if a cloud had lifted. We walked for nearly an hour, talking about family. Rosh Hashanah was approaching, so I asked, "Ma, do you believe in G-d?" "Yes, G-dspeaks with me." Then, in true Sunny fashion, she said, "Enough about me, let's talk about you," and so we did. Back at the house, she took a deep nap. Upon waking, the cloud returned. I was thankful for the window of clarity. Mom recognized me on her last day, March 7, 2005.

These photographs of Sunny reflect our mutual respect, honesty, humor, and eternal love.




I am the photographer, the artist, and the vehicle that captures moments in life and time exactly as they are and as they will remain in that image.



STRANGE SHAPES



BIOGRAPHY - Donna Ferrato, b. 1949, Waltham, MA - Ferrato is an independent photojournalist and activist who has illuminated the diverse experiences of women for over 50 years. By capturing the extremes—trust and trauma, pain and pleasure, life and death—her body of work tells a story much greater than the sum of its parts. Through her camera, Ferrato has always been on a mission to change social attitudes and unjust judgments. Ferrato first received critical recognition for her work about the horrors of domestic violence in her book, Living with the Enemy, published by Aperture in 1991. Living with the Enemy inspired Joe Biden when he was a senator to pass the Violence Against Women Act. Since then, she has continued to tell the stories of survivors of domestic violence, while using her lens to celebrate the full circle of women's lives. Her book, Holy, won the 2021 Lucie Foundation Photobook Award for Best Independent, Single Author Photo Book.

Other awards include the W. Eugene Smith Grant (1986), Robert F. Kennedy Award for Humanistic Photography (1987), the Kodak Crystal Eagle for Courage in Journalism (1997), and most recently, a public art grant from the NYC Mayor's Office to create awareness about gender- based violence, The Wall of Silence, at the Collect Pond Park.

Ferrato founded a non-profit called Domestic Abuse Awareness, and in 2014 launched a campaign called I Am Unbeatable which features women who have left their abusers. In 2016, TIME magazine announced her photograph of a woman being hit by her husband (1982) as one of the "100 Most Influential Photographs of All Time." She is based in New York City, still fighting for women's rights.

In 2020, Ferrato was included as one of the Hundred Heroines by the British Arts foundation, Hundred Heroines.

FANNY

BY DONNA FERRATO

Fanny grew up as the muse of two anti-violence documentary photographers.

She exited the birth canal to the beat of a high voltage 283 Vivitar flash gun popping off on the ceiling of our bedroom. Her father was the Vietnam Inc, Magnum photographer, Philip Jones Griffiths. And from the minute she stuck her head out between my legs and looked up into his camera, she was the focus of our lenses. An oasis of calm in our intense, war-torn lives.

It wasn't easy to be an attentive new mama photographer. I was just embarking on a lifelong mission to document the war on women, and both Philip and I travelled a lot on assignments. Sometimes I took her along, or she would stay home with my parents in Ohio. "I didn't feel neglected," Fanny says. "Being with my grandparents, I felt really loved. Also, I was really proud of my parents—what they were doing was so brave and important." She understood that the life of photographers was never easy and never boring.

"I was photographed all of the time, by my mom, my dad, my grandpa, even my grandma," Fanny remembers. Her grandmother taught her how to thread a needle, how to ride a two wheeler. Her grandfather, a chest surgeon and a passionate photographer, documented the milestones I missed. Plus, a large group

of famous photographers were her second family. Many pictures of them are in an archive called Fanny and the Photographers. Fanny was fine with this photography mania she never knew anything else. Instinctively she knew when we were taking her picture it was an expression of our love. And Fanny called the shots. She gave consent and always said which pictures could not be published. "My mom and dad are such great photographers," says Fanny, now a mother with a camera herself. "How lucky am I to have had my picture taken by them?"





BIOGRAPHY - The artistic appeal of Edwina Sandys lies in her powerful subject matter. She has tackled profound ideas with panache. Her clearly recognizable style uses positive and negative images to dramatic effect.

During the past 40 years Edwina has created art of international acclaim that includes sculpture and paintings. For the 1979 United Nations' Year of the Child, she created three different monumental sculptures, installed at UN centers in New York, Geneva and Vienna. A decade later she created Woman Free for the United Nations' Division for the Advancement of Women, Vienna, Austria. In 1989, to mark the end of the Cold War, Edwina used sections of the Berlin Wall to create a sculpture, Breakthrough, now permanently sited at Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri, where in 1946 her grandfather Winston Churchill gave his historic "Iron Curtain" speech. Subsequently, Edwina created BreakFree, also cut out from the Berlin Wall, for the Freedom Court at the Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential Library at Hyde Park, New York.

In 2007 Edwina's Pillars of Justice was installed in front of the Toronto Law Courts at the McMurtry Gardens of Justice. The 20' wide aluminum sculpture consists of a stylized courthouse facade supported by pillars shaped like men and women. These represent the jury, the part of the legal system in which the public most often participates. "People are the pillars of justice," she says. Edwina does not focus solely on political subjects, but frequently explores the relationships between man and woman.

Major works include her series The States of Woman for the New York Academy of Sciences, which include her iconic Eve's Apple, and The Marriage Bed, which is in the permanent collection of the Brooklyn Museum of Art.

British born Edwina Sandys has been a New Yorker since the 1970's. Edwina was married for

thirty years to New York architect, the late Rich-

ard D. Kaplan.

Through her unique life experience, Edwina relates her work to the global issues of our time; environment, equality, war and peace, and in particular women's causes, and emancipation. Her art reaches a broad audience through the PBS biographical documentary One Bite of the Apple

Edwina recently installed Paradise Regained a sculpture for a pre school in West Palm Beach.
