CARTER BURDEN GALLERY ANNOUNCES NEW EXHIBITIONS BY RE-EMERGING NYC ARTISTS

Carter Burden Gallery presents three new exhibitions: in celebration of Women's History Month *About Women* in the East Gallery features Ellen Denuto, Vija Doks, and Joy Nagy; in the West Gallery *Our Planet in Peril* features Barbara Brier, Rena Diana, Madeline Farr, Madlyn Goldman, Ronnie Grill, Judy Kaplan, Patricia Miller, Stephanie Suskin, and Sheila Wolper, as part of NextActArt; and *On the Wall* features an installation entitled *Prayer Flags - Good Will Wishers* by Barbara Lubliner. The exhibitions run from March 24 - April 20, 2022 at 548 West 28th Street in New York City. The reception will be on Thursday, March 24 from 6 - 8pm; masks are required. The gallery hours are Tuesday - Friday, 11 a.m. - 5 p.m., Saturday 11 a.m. - 6 p.m.

Ellen Denuto

Ellen Denuto presents photographic installations that recognize female Carter Burden Gallery artists in their studios as part of the exhibition *About Women*. Suspended below the photographs of the artists are a collection of objects from their studios, adding an additional dimension to the pieces. The relationship between the tangible items and the images transports the work to the present moment, creating a sense intimacy. The artists depicted are Mona Brody, Pauline Chernichaw, and Gail Winbury. Shooting on location is her specialty, using the element of the unknown to guide her creative process. Denuto states, "Ever present, the photographer is witness to the world's beauty- pain, injustice and triumph creating a visual journal of our time."

Ellen Denuto, founding member of the New Jersey Chapter of the American Society of Media Photographers is a regular juror, guest speaker and workshop leader for *ASMP*, Professional Photographers of America, Professional Woman Photographers, *SOHO* Photo, and various Colleges and Universities. After earning degrees in Art and Education, Denuto worked with the *Agfa*, *Minolta* and *Ilford* Corporations as a guest speaker and contributing photographer for their product publications and trade shows. The Image Bank founder Larry Freed, selected her personal images for his International Collection, which led to worldwide exposure including *FOTO*, Darkroom Photography, *GRAPHIS*, Minolta Mirror and Japanese Playboy magazines. A selection of her commercial clients include Starbucks, Target Stores, Penguin Books, and Apple Computers. Her work can be found in the permanent collections of the New Jersey State Museum, Trenton, NJ; The Kodak Galleries, Rochester, NY; Paterson Museum, Paterson, NJ; among others.

Vija Doks

In *About Women*, Vija Doks presents a selection of oil paintings from her *Famous Women Portrait Series*. The inspiration for which stemmed from Gerhard Richter's 48 *Portraits*, which focused on famous men as part of the German Pavilion at the 1972

Venice Biennale. It was criticized at the time of the exhibition because it did not include one portrait of a woman. Reading about it in Dietmar Elger's biography of Richter, Doks assumed some industrious woman had painted a response, but none had. In her research, Doks discovered that Gottfried Helnwein had created a counterpart to Richter, depicting 48 renowned women in monochromatic red. It still gnawed at Doks that a woman hadn't done this. Thus, in 2011, forty years after Richter's work, she embarked on her own 48 portrait series and approached it alphabetically. Working with the women pictured in the American Heritage Dictionary, she would first read their biography then select a photo that resonated with her. Unsatisfied with just 48 portraits, Doks continued her series and now has over one hundred paintings and is expanding the series by including full figures and dual portraits. With an unadorned background, these paintings primarily focus on the figure's countenance, with detailed renderings of the skin and facial features, their clothes and accessories executed by a simple linear outline. The women represented include Elaine de Kooning, Zora Neale Hurston, Maya Deren, Jane Goodall, Harriet Tubman, Empress Dowager Cixi, among many more.

New York-based artist Vija Doks was born in a displaced persons camp in Germany of Latvian parents. She grew up in Kalamazoo Michigan and received a BA from Western Michigan University. Relocating to New York City in 1976, she received a MS in Library Science from Columbia University and worked as a law librarian until her retirement in 2016. Doks pursued her art career starting in the 90s by taking courses at the School of Visual Arts where she studied under Nancy Chunn, Georgia Marsh and Judith Linhares. Exhibits include a solo show at the Brooklyn Parsonage Latvian Center, and group shows at NYU's Small Works Shows curated by Ronald Feldman and Richard Witter, Exit Art, CurateNYC, and the Hudson Guild among others. Most recently, she had a two-person show at the Carter Burden Gallery (CBG) and she was the featured artist at CBG's "On the Wall" space in 2018 and again in 2021. Her painting "Red Ibis" was included in the 2012 movie, "The Oranges." In addition, Doks has published a cartoon cookbook "Letts Eat," and her writing has been published in *Paragraph* and *Law Lines*. She recently completed a series of portraits of notable Tennessee women in collaboration with singer, songwriter Candace Corrigan.

Joy Nagy

Joy Nagy presents assemblages from her series Family Matters as part of About Women. Utilizing inherited objects from her mother, aunt, and brother the work represents a reappraisal of values. Nagy states, "To me my brother's death was not only about his loss but about the entire family and its interrelationships. The paintings, assemblages, and installations include objects and photographs that record my family's issues of immigration, hard work, and love." Still processing her legacy, she sorts and documents over two hundred treasured textiles, including handkerchiefs, silk scarves, handmade dresses, ornamental flowers, photographs and filled suitcases as part of her artistic process.

Joy Nagy was born in New York City and is an interdisciplinary artist who works in a variety of media, including drawing, painting, and sculpture. Nagy earned an Associate

of Applied Science degree at Fashion Institute of Technology where she majored in Apparel Design and has since studied at The New York Studio School with Graham Nickson, The Art Students League in New York City with renown anatomist Frank Porcu, and currently at the Greenwich House Pottery. For over a decade, she taught painting techniques to New York City middle and high school students as a teaching artist through the School of Visual Arts' Education Department Liberty Partnership Program. Nagy is the author and illustrator of the book Chocolate Astrology, published by Clarkson Potter a division of Random House and Build Your Own Alphabet published by Harry N Abrams. Her visual artwork has been shown in solo and group exhibitions by museums and galleries in the United States and abroad. She has been awarded fellowships at nationally renowned artist residencies— including Vermont Studio Center, The Jentel Artist Residency Program, Ox-Bow School of the Arts, and the Lower Manhattan Cultural Council residency on Governors Island.

Barbara Lubliner

Barbara Lubliner presents her installation *Prayer Flags - Good Will Wishers* for *On the Wall*. At the cusp of 2022 the artists started transforming discarded materials into this installation based on Tibetan Buddhist prayer flags and the tradition of hanging colorful cloths to send blessings of peace, happiness, and good fortune out into the universe. Each flag is 43 by 26 inches and are made of upcycled plastic slide sleeve pages, various paper scraps, and paint chips in corresponding colors. Transforming these castoffs into art underscores the power and possibility of transformation. Lubliner elaborates, "As I make the flags, I imbue them with positive feelings, healing myself and wishing good will out into the world. I am delighted to have them hang "On the Wall" gently releasing good vibrations."

New York sculptor, Barbara Lubliner moves fluidly between performance art, works on paper, and sculpture both large and small. In recent years Lubliner's public installations and studio work have involved re-purposing trash into playful art, shifting the focus from environmental blight to creative production. She is at once a performance and visual artist, sculptor, panel moderator, teacher, curator and the creator of a feminist newspaper. Lubliner received her BFA from Boston University School of Fine Arts. Solo exhibitions include the Gibson Gallery Museum at SUNY Potsdam; Main Gallery, Port Washington Public Library, NY; and Pierro Gallery, South Orange, NJ. Group exhibitions include Art in Public Places, Stamford, CT; Gallery Merz, Sag Harbor, NY; Ocean County College, NJ; and University of Rhode Island in Kingston. In New York City, Lubliner has participated in exhibits at the Chelsea Art Museum, Ernest Rubenstein Gallery, and Queens College Art Center. Recent performance venues include the Brooklyn Museum and Le Petit Versailles garden in New York City.

Our Planet in Peril

In honor of Earth Day on April 22, nine mixed media artists who are members of the group **NextActArt** present *Our Planet in Peril*, which features a range of works that address both environmental issues as a whole, as well as the adverse effects of plastic dependency and plastic capitalism on human and marine life. The beauty of our planet and the detrimental effect human "advancements" have on our lives are front and

center in this exhibition. In their works the artists search for ways we as individuals, a nation, and world can make constructive change to protect our environment and its inhabitants. In the exhibition a collaborative grid comprised of nine separate works symbolically demonstrate ways in which plastic is both used in our everyday lives and is harmful to us and our environment. The next step is to address how we, as a community, nation, and world, can make the changes necessary to protect ourselves and the earth.

The artists featured in the exhibition are the original members of NextActArt. The group is the brainchild of kindred spirits who found great meaning and satisfaction in pursuing visual arts as a second, third, or "umpteenth" career. The vision of NextActArt's founders, Barbara Brier, Madeline Farr, and Stephanie Suskin, is to inspire later-in-life creatives to build community and realize the value of artistic expression. They exhibited as a group at Ashawagh Hall in East Hampton in May 2016 and July 2019, at Cerces Gallery in December 2017, a charity show for God's Love We Deliver in NYC, and with CBG in 2018 and 2020. Several members of the group have participated in both solo and juried group shows in New York City and across the United States.

Located in Chelsea, the Carter Burden Gallery is a program of The Carter Burden Network designed to give a voice to New York City's re-emerging older professional artists. The Carter Burden Network is a non-profit organization established in 1971 by the late Carter Burden, a New York City Councilman.

Fish Are Ingesting Plastic, 2021

This piece conveys the outward beauty of fish, but fish suffer from ingesting plastic and the toxins from plastic waste threaten not only the life of fish, but the health and life of humans who rely on fish for sustenance and pleasure.



Patricia Miller

After Dinner, 2021

After Dinner illustrates that use of plastic in our everyday lives is habit forming. These items are non-recyclable. Consciously choosing to break the habit, e.g., storing leftovers in non-plastic containers, can help remedy this critical problem.



Stephanie Suskin

Message in the Bottle, 2021

Illustrates the crisis of our oceans becoming global waste cans and points out that we all share a responsibility to save our planet. One way we can help is by making a habit of bringing plastic water and soda bottle to re-cycling centers.



Sheila Wolper Imitation of Life, 2021

Imitation of Life is made with discarded plastic pull tops, buttons, manufacturing plastic waste, plastic jar covers, and paper. As plastic detritus increases, destroying our oceans, rivers, and lakes, it will eventually become its own imitative form of life complete with the ability to reproduce.



Rena Diana Strangled, 2021

It is sadly ironic that much plastic packaging is labeled with disclaimers about keeping it away from toddlers because it could strangle them. Well, our entire planet is being strangled by the plastics we discard daily. My piece is an effort to convey this environmental disaster.



Ronnie Grill Entangled In Plastic, 2021

This piece illustrates the plight of sea turtles and other marine animals too often entangled by plastic waste. Irreparable harm can be reversed if world leaders collaborate to eliminate single-use plastics, in concert with climate change policy.



Madlyn Goldman Dancing Debris, 2021

Dancing Debris was created to bring attention to the environmental catastrophe of disposable plastics that plague our planet. Made with "unused" doggie bags, bubble wrap, food packaging, straws and buttons woven into a plastic frame.

DROWNING IN PLASTIC: FACTS



Adverse health effects from plastic ingestion: cancers, birth defects, immune system

problems, childhood developmental issues and more.



Toxins from plastic have entered the food chain, threatening human health after fish are

contaminated. Examples include lead, cadmium, mercury.



Tiny particles of plastic called microplastics, can be found in drinking water, many foods, and human feces.

By 2050, there will be more plastic than fish in our oceans.



Autopsies of human cadavers show microplastics in tissue samples from lungs, liver, spleen, kidneys.

VIJA DOKS

Statement

The original inspiration for my Famous Women Portrait Series was Gerhard Richter's 48 Portraits. In his 48 Portraits Richter 48 famous men. At the time of the exhibit in 1971, the show was criticized because it did not even include one portrait of a woman. Reading about it in Dietmar Elgen's biography of Richter, I assumed some industrious woman, had painted a response, but none had. In my research, I did discover that Gottfried Helnwein had done a counterpart to Richter, in his version of 48 Portraits, depicting 48 renowned women in monochromatic red. It gnawed at me that a woman hadn't done this. Thus, in 2011, 40 years after Richter's work, I embarked on my own 48 portraits.

Even though Richter's 48 Portraits was the impetus for this work, I still wanted to make it my own. The size of my paintings is 18" by 18" and I could not stick to Richter's monochromatic palate. When I first started this series, I included the women's clothing and accessories, but as I continued, I realized that I didn't want the clothing to distract from the essence of the individual. Thus, clothing is depicted only by line. The one exception is in my portrait of Sarah Bernhardt, where I had tremendous fun painting the bat hat.

I approached this series alphabetically. Working with the women pictured in the American Heritage Dictionary, I would first read a biography of the woman and then chose a photo of her that resonated with me. Some of the photos being lesser-known images or even snapshots.

Upon completing 48 portraits, I was not satisfied. There were just too many exceptional women that I hadn't painted. So, I ended up painting over one hundred paintings.

I continue to expand on this series by including full figure portraits and dual portraits.

New York-based artist Vija Doks was born in a displaced persons camp in Germany of Latvian parents. She grew up in Kalamazoo Michigan and received a BA from Western Michigan University. Relocating to New York City in 1976, she received a MS in Library Science from Columbia University and worked as a law librarian until her retirement in 2016. Vija pursued her art career starting in the 90s, by taking courses at the School of Visual Arts where she studied under Nancy Chunn, Georgia Marsh and Judith Linhares. Exhibits include a solo show at the Brooklyn Parsonage Latvian Center, and group shows at NYU's Small Works Shows curated by Ronald Feldman and Richard Witter, Exit Art, CurateNYC, and the Hudson Guild among others. Most recently, she had a two-person show at the Carter Burden Gallery (CBG) and she was the featured artist at CBG's "On the Wall" space in 2018 and again in 2021. Her painting "Red Ibis" was included in the 2012 movie, "The Oranges." In addition, Vija has published a cartoon cookbook "Letts Eat," and her writing has been published in Paragraph and Law Lines. She recently completed a series of portraits of notable Tennessee women in collaboration with singer, songwriter Candace Corrigan.

Family Matters 2018- present

'Family Matters' is the series that evolved as a result of my inheriting the contents of four storage units.

My aunt died in 1992, my mother in 2004. I recovered their possessions in four storage units that belonged to my recently deceased brother. Over 200 textiles handkerchiefs, silk scarves, handmade dresses and ornamental flowers, photographs and objects filled suitcases and cardboard boxes.

Scarf Apothecary-Over 200 textiles, silk scarves and textiles found in an old suitcase are now placed under glass

Inspired by the scarf apothecary, color and tactile quality of my silk scarf legacy are captured in this series of individual panels on paper. Pastel, gouache on Arches archival 300lb paper 7 x 40"

This work represents a reappraisal of values. To me my brother's death was not only about his loss but, about the entire family and it's interrelationships. The paintings, assemblages and installations include objects and photographs that record my family's issues of immigration, hard work and love.

Joy Nagy (b. New York City, New York) is an interdisciplinary artist who works in a variety of media, including drawing, painting, and sculpture.

Nagy earned an Associate of Applied Science degree at Fashion Institute of Technology where she majored in Apparel Design and has since studied at The New York Studio School with Graham Nickson, The Art Students League in New York City with reknown anatomist Frank Porcu, and currently at the Greenwich House Pottery. For over a decade, she taught painting techniques to New York City middle and high schools students as a teaching artist through School of Visual Arts' Education Department Liberty Partnership Program. Statement

Prayer Flags - Good Will Wishers for 2022

At the cusp of 2022 I started transforming discarded materials into "Prayer Flags - Good Will Wishers," based on Tibetan Buddhist prayer flags and the tradition of hanging colorful cloths to send blessings of peace, happiness, and good fortune out into the universe. For centuries in the Himalayas, practitioners have planted prayer flags outside their homes and places of spiritual practice for the wind to carry the good wishes across the countryside, benefiting those in the vicinity.

While Buddhist prayer flags are inscribed with a variety of texts and symbols developed over the years, I focus on the colors. Traditionally, prayer flags come in sets of five: one in each of five colors representing the basic elements: yellow--earth, green--water, redfire, white--air, blue--space. Balancing these elements externally brings harmony to the environment. Balancing the elements internally brings health to the body and the mind.

I started making my first set of "Prayer Flags - Good Will Wishers" in 2016 after a project I had been very excited about fell through. Instead of dwelling in anger and blame I decided to focus on compassion and good wishes.

I made similar small sets during the 2020 shutdown which I hung at a nearby intersection to spread good will to the people walking and hanging out in the street that was closed to traffic.

Each flag in the 2022 set is 43 x 26 inches. They are made of upcycled plastic slide sleeve pages, various paper scraps, and paint chips. Transforming castoffs into art underscores the power and possibility of transformation.

As I make the flags, I imbue them with positive feelings, healing myself and wishing good will out into the world. I am delighted to have them hang "On the Wall" gently releasing good vibrations.

Bio

New York artist Barbara Lubliner, also known as Ms. Muscle, moves fluidly from performance art to works on paper to sculpture and installation. She transforms traditional and nontraditional materials into concept-based artwork that is iconic and quirky. Lubliner is most known for upcycling trash and exploring the female experience through sculpture and performance. Playful integration of ideas is at the heart of all her work.

EDUCATION

B.F.A. Boston University School of Fine Arts

BARBARA BRIER

After a lengthy break, I recently returned to the visual arts. My interest in photography led me to collage and the 'new world' of photo manipulation captivated me. Today, my work is essentially a combination of my own photos (in original form and/or manipulated) and paper collage, with the addition of another medium as needed.

As a rule, I find a photo I particularly like and, because I am captivated by connections, search my files for things that complement or contrast, following the direction the initial piece dictates. When a work demands something more, I add ink, oil pastels, paint, etc., and voilà: mixed media!

Photographically, I am attracted to the juxtaposition of old and new. So, I sometimes shoot, collage, then shoot again and use pieces of one collage in another.

RENA DIANA

The underlying geometric shapes and intricate linear patterns of both the natural and urban worlds intrigue and delight me. They enkindle my imagination and a reverence for the elegant beauty that surrounds us in the most humble, ordinary spaces, as we walk through village and city, forest and field.

My paintings are abstract renderings, pared down to essential elements, overlapped and intertwined, with a wide range of palettes, from bold and vibrant to more muted and subdued. Over the past three years, my art has primarily been inspired by the glacially carved shoreline of Lake Champlain and the magical interplay of light, wind, stones and water.

MADELINE FARR

Madeline Farr is a mixed media abstract artist, working with paint, collage and photography. She describes her work as "stimulated by the world we live in and the connections we have to one another." She goes on to say, "I comment and react to what I see and feel needs to be said about human relationships and the world around me."

As, a co-founder and owner of BFM Gallery, Madeline was recognized as being among the first to introduce one-of-a-kind American contemporary crafts to the New York interior design community. She was a partner in the Madison Avenue gallery PM and Stein, where the focus was on young and upcoming American artists. Enlisted by the Home Editor following trends for "City Living" and "At Home", she free-lanced for the Home sections of both the New York and Long Island Newsday.

From 2007 - 2015, Madeline was an instructor for Odyssey Art At Sea. There, she taught watercolor on cruise ships giving her the opportunity to visit exotic Ports throughout the world. In recent years, she has been able to devote more time to creating her own art. Her studio is on the Upper East Side of Manhattan. Madeline is a founding partner of NextActArt, which includes a group of artists who meet monthly to discuss art, plan events, exhibit their work, donate some of the proceeds to non-profit organizations and engage the community.

MADLYN GOLDMAN

My father was a saver so it is no accident that I am drawn to recycled materials. Searching for and finding these discarded objects at flea markets, junkyards and garage sales is an integral part of my process. The challenge is to combine disparate found pieces along with my handcrafted elements to give them new life and personality as a "member of the family". I work spontaneously and intuitively

constantly reassessing the progress of each piece. Each action informs the next until a distinct identity emerges and a character is born. I love making these quirky pieces with their playful personalities and their thoughtfully matched names. It is my hope that my "extended family", with its gritty and whimsical flavor, will evoke a sense of delight and amusement.

RONNIE GRILL

I use my life adventures and world travels for inspiration to my mixed media and watercolor paintings. Handmade papers, photographs, color, and shapes are used to create a sense of movement and balance in my work.

JUDY KAPLAN

I am a former teacher who has always loved the arts. After retiring I took a collage class and was hooked in more ways than one -- my obsession became making fish out of paper. I love color, texture and patterns and have expanded into mixed media, creating a world of fantasy. Papers and art supplies have taken over my apartment and my life.

PATRICIA MILLER

As an artist, I ask myself what role can I play to support preservation of the environment? My consciousness about the beauty and vulnerability of nature has been heightened by both the global climate crisis and by my stage of life, which allows more time for reflection. Every landscape awakens the senses and makes one aware of the uniqueness of different environments. Glaciers are seen chunking and melting in my work, while a rain forest shows various types of trees sharing the soil's nutrients peacefully, as we would wish for in a multi-cultural world.

Using collage and mixed media/assemblage, I attempt to transform the amazing phenomenon of nature into expressive images. These media enable me to interpret the natural world partly in abstraction, partly in reality. I use a composite of personal photographs, found and hand-made paper, acrylics, pastels, and objects (e.g. stones, shells, sand, bark, clay) and multiple gels, such as crackle, glass bead, lava, modeling paste, which add texture and depth.

STEPHANIE SUSKIN

For me, creating art is the counterbalance to the noise and chaos of life. I am a mixed media artist - an urban dweller with a soul deeply rooted in nature - who finds inspiration everywhere. I have not yet encountered a creative medium I did not want to explore. My art expresses what I've learned about all these varied materials and techniques, combining, and integrating them in forms that range from collage to encaustic and from painting to found-object sculpture.

SHEILA WOLPER

Using found photographs and photographs of my vintage toy collection, I create an alternative, dream-like world of distorted reality. Delving below the surface of the existing stereotypes of men, women, and children, I explore their complexity through visual narratives. The fears, fantasies, and magical thinking of young children and the struggles facing women in today's society are a consistent focus in my work. Juxtaposition of myriad images, through photo transfer and collage, create facial and physical distortions of the people, toys, and animals that inhabit this fantasy universe. Using gesso, acrylic paint, and oil pastels I create multilayered backgrounds of extraordinary texture and depth. My images float or are anchored within this milieu and reflect a world where the fine line between fantasy and reality is ambiguous.
